### **Speakers corner for March 2022**

Our speaker in March was Jenny Marks who is the National Garden Scheme (NGS) county organiser for Cambridgeshire and is based in Duxford. Jenny's talk entitled '*Beyond the garden gate*' gave us a glimpse behind the aims and history of the NGS and what charities are supported.

It started in 1859 when William Rathbone, a Liverpool merchant, employed Mary Robinson to nurse his wife at home in her final illness. After his wife's death William employed Mary to help people in Liverpool who could not afford a nurse, to have nursing care in their homes. Later, with the help of Florence Nightingale, William developed the service and so the 'District Nursing Service' began. This later developed into the Queen's Nursing Institute (QNI). Then, in 1926, a QNI council member and leading socialite, Miss Elsie Wagg came up with the idea of gardens opening to the public for a "shilling a head" which would go towards the District Nursing Service and so the garden scheme really got going with its gardens and home-made cake.

In 1948 the National Health Service was founded, and local authorities took on the home nursing service, but money was still needed for retired nurses and the QNI. In 1980 the NGS became independent of the QNI to fund a range of nursing charities including Macmillan cancer Support, Marie Curie, Hospice UK, Carers Trust and Parkinson's UK. Other beneficiaries are

charities that promote the physical and mental health benefits of gardens and gardening. In 2021 over £3 million was donated by the NGS to its charities.

Today there are not just single gardens in the scheme but there are 31 allotment gardens, 18 community gardens and 16 hospice gardens and many group village gardens. All the gardens and their opening times are detailed in the NGS guide affectionately known as the '*Yellow Book*' because its cover became yellow in 1949 to symbolise regeneration.

Jenny then went on to give an illustrated talk about many different gardens local to us in Haverhill. To mention but a few:- Clover Cottage in Streetly End, with snowdrops in winter and roses in summer; The music maze and garden in Balsham, which are open by arrangement only.

In Linton there will be seven group gardens, open for the first time on 15<sup>th</sup> May.

In Duxford, group gardens open on Sunday 5<sup>th</sup> June.

Many other gardens were detailed.

Next month's speaker is a local lady, Amanda Sutherland, who is talking on "My Creative Journey in Fashion". She has had an exciting career journey through film, television and theatrical costume design with an insight into running a successful accessories business. At the end of the presentation the ever-popular gift shop will be open for members to browse the latest collections of Amanda's handmade accessories with the opportunity to buy a range of fabric jewellery and eco-accessories at a members group discount. The meeting will start at 10.30am. Entrance to the Arts Centre will be via the front or rear doors which will open at 10am.


